
## New Face, Same Problems?

- House Republican objections this session have centered on reducing federal spending year over year
- When was the last time that happened? \*Spoiler Alert\*
  - Never
- Can Speaker Johnson find consensus within the conference on spending AND negotiate with Democrat controlled Senate and White House?



#### Remember Me?

- Laminated products not exempted from the definition of hardwood plywood must be tested and certified as meeting the hardwood plywood formaldehyde emission standard beginning March 22, 2024
  - Testing certification exemptions exist for no-added formaldehyde (NAF) and ultra low-emitting formaldehyde (ULEF) resins
- AHFA petitioned the EPA for a wider exemption, given the extremely constrained supply of NAF/ULEF options and data showing emission reduction from value added finishing process
  - EPA denied the petition/request
- EPA is also drafting a risk assessment for formaldehyde uses – initially composite wood products were not being considered given the strict emission limits
  - However, EPA recently decided to provide a risk assessment for ALL uses
  - Potential consequence is elimination of the molecule
  - Broader consequences around liability and legal action from outside groups



# STURDY Act Compliance

- Clothing storage units and other covered products manufactured AFTER September 2, 2023, must comply with the new safety standard/regulation adopted by the CPSC (ASTM 2057-2023) as required by the STURDY Act
- Units made prior to this date may still be sold
- Congressional authors have sent letters to industry stakeholders to urge immediate compliance



## New Majorities in Both Chambers?



- Narrow majorities in both the House and Senate set a low bar for flipping control
- 17 current House Republicans represent districts won by Joe Biden in 2020
  - Will Speaker vacancy impact House Republican prospects?
  - The moderate Republicans remain concerned about overly conservative spending positions
- 3 vulnerable Senate Democrats are in states won by Donald Trump in 2020 (Montana, Ohio, West Virginia)
  - Democrats are defending 8 of the most competitive Senate races this cycle
  - Incumbent Republican Senators are not expected to have significant challenges

### Here we go again (?)

- President Biden is a vulnerable incumbent (as Trump was in 2020)
- What's weighing Biden down?
  - Economy
  - Age
  - Student Loan policies
  - Immigration
  - Foreign Wars
- Lingering criminal indictments have not damaged Trump in the Republican primary or the base
  - Each failed/successful Speaker candidate sought his endorsement
