
Trump's Second Term Priorities

- Tariffs
 - Revenue for tax reform
 - Leverage in trade negotiations
 - Rebuild US manufacturing base
- Immigration & Southern Border
 - Rescind policies that Biden Administration put in place
- Tax Reform
 - Dozens of 2017 Tax bill provisions expiring at end of 2025
- Deregulation
 - Building on first term success around shrinking regulatory state, expect another round of aggressive deregulatory measures across federal agencies

Republican Congress

- Republicans could win up to 55 Senate seats significant governing majority
 - New Senate Republican Leader as Sen. McConnell steps down
 - Sens. John Thune, John Cornyn, and Rick Scott ٠ running to replace
- House Republicans appear likely to maintain their slight ٠ majority
- Republican sweep of WH, House, and Senate opens ٠ legislative possibilities using budget reconciliation process
 - Allows legislation related to 'revenue and spending' ٠ to move through Senate under simple 50 vote majority
 - Important vehicle for tax reform and other priorities ٠

Potential Cabinet Picks

- Key economic advisor, Amb. Robert Lighthizer, is under consideration for several posts including Secretary of Treasury or Secretary of Commerce
 - Important appointment given his influence around tariff policy
- Several loyal Members of Congress possible cabinet members
 - Rep. Elise Stefanik, Sens. Bill Hagerty, Tom Cotton, Marco Rubio
- Former rivals also under consideration including Gov. Doug Burgum

What's Next for Democrats?

- Party without a clear leader following poor election performance
- President-elect Trump restored his victories in the Midwest (PA, MI, WI)
 - Biden won those 'Blue Wall' states in 2020 so a turnaround is possible
- Clear that Democrats need a more coherent economic message to connect with voters across all demographics
