


#### LIFESTYLE

- "Gen Z is not a lazy generation, but it is an entitled generation because they have the freedom to make a more broad set of decisions than older generations that have financial obligations. They're different."
- "Over half of younger adults are living at home with their parents. Because many Gen Zers don't have a mortgage or family to support, they have more financial freedom to make different life choices."
- "Gen Z also wants their job to accommodate their lifestyle, rather than the other way around. This leads to the younger generation being more likely to work in the gig economy or change jobs frequently, rather than stay in a work environment that they don't like."
- "Gen Zers are less likely to seek promotions because they don't want to work overtime and have extra responsibilities that could impinge on their lifestyle."
