What's New in Washington



- House Democrats finally advanced a key portion of President Biden's domestic agenda by passing bipartisan infrastructure bill
 - Previously passed the Senate with 69 votes in August 2021
- Social spending plan still must overcome disagreements with Senator Manchin (D-WV) and Senator Sinema (D-AZ) in several key areas
- House moderates have demanded a Congressional Budget Office (CBO) Score before House passage
- House and Senate are hoping votes on the broader spending package happen during the week of November 15th

OSHA ETS – Employee COVID-19 Vaccination Requirement

- *Federal Appeals Court in New Orleans has temporarily blocked the mandate*
- ETS goes into effect immediately
 - OSHA is accepting public comments until December 6, 2021
- Covered employers (> 100 employees) will be responsible for determining vaccination status, verifying that status, and maintaining records for those employees
 - The deadline for the vaccination requirement is January 4, 2022
- Employers must provide up to 4 hours of paid leave for employees to receive each vaccine dose as well as necessary sick time to recover from any side effects
 - The ETS does not require employers to pay for the cost of weekly testing unless covered by other laws/policies





Supply Chain Disruption

- Administration and congressional leaders are exploring various ways to improve supply chain performance
- Ocean Shipping Reform Act (OSRA) would give the Federal Maritime Commission (FMC) greater authority over shippers
 - Require shippers to notify customers when goods physical available
 - Reforms related to demurrage/detention, unreasonable allocation of vessel space and equipment
 - Develop minimum service standards to meet the public interest
- AHFA is engaging with stakeholders on the newly announced dwell fees at the Ports of LA and Long Beach



STURDY Act

- STURDY Act passed the House in June 2021
- Awaiting Senate action
 - Senate Commerce Committee could consider at any time
- Former top House Energy and Commerce Consumer Protection staffer, Alex Hoehn-Saric, is newly confirmed CPSC Chairman
- STURDY Act provides accelerated rulemaking authority to CPSC outside of the statutory Section 7 and 9 process

Effects of Redistricting

- 7 states will lose a seat
 - CA, MI, OH, PA, NY, IL, WV
- 5 states gains seats
 - TX (+2), CO, MT, NC, FL
- 14 House Democrats have announced retirement (more to come)

Who controls redistricting in each state?

- Republicans (187 districts)
- Democrats (75)
- Both parties (71)
- Independent commission (96)
- Single district (6)
